<b>bonaa suuna</b> , n.a.	basket used for <i>iobo</i> (sea sausage)
<b>hoi</b> , n.o.	basket of different shapes and sizes woven from pandanus or coconut leaves
<b>hoofoo</b> , n.o.	women's oval-shaped fishing basket/bag woven from coconut midribs
<b>kae</b> , n.a.	small bag
<b>maari</b> , n.a.	basket with different sizes, finely woven from coconut leaves, used for keeping valuable things, also used for carrying food such as sweet potatoes, taro etc.
<b>urisi</b> , n.o.	rope made of banana leaves used for carrying knapsacks
<b>vakebin</b> , n.?	palm tree sheaths used as part of the knapsack, which is mostly used by women. The mature sheaths are dried and folded into rectangle shapes and these are used to protect their backs when carrying goods in the knapsacks
<b>vateen</b> , n.a.	traditional knapsack in which women carry food or clothing
